From the Mayor


Support for Businesses in Ham Lake

Happy New Year, fellow Ham Lakers! I hope you had a wonderful holiday season. COVID has had quite an impact on our lives in the past year. Lock downs, quarantines, masks, family separation and illness have affected all of us in some fashion. For some, the toll has been high. Loved ones passing, not being able to visit family members in facilities, children learning from home and the like. For others the impact has been especially devastating. I'm referring to the many businesses in Ham Lake that were hit hard economically. Hair care, bars and restaurants, workout facilities, churches, dance theaters, etc. all being shut down, but their bills still show up in the mail. This prompted the federal government to pass the CARES act. This article is focused on one aspect of that package: A grant program to help businesses that suffered at the hand of COVID restrictions.

The feds allocated money to the states who in turn allocated money to communities based on population. The monies were to be distributed in grant form to qualifying businesses under the federal guidelines. The cities could determine the amount of the grants and some prerequisites as long as it was within the confines of the law. We had a very short window to get the word out, process applications and distribute the funds and if there was any left over, it was returned to the state.

After plastering the information out in mailers, city website and *The Ham Laker* we waited for the applications. Because of time and personnel constraints, Ham Lake hired a third-party company to process the applications and determine the grant amounts. Ham Lake was allocated \$1,243,926 to be granted. We guessed at the number of qualifying businesses that would apply and divided it by the \$1.2 million and we ended up hoping to give all applicants \$20,000 or at least as much as they qualified for. We also decided on \$5,000 for non-profits. Well, we weren't too far off.

We were able to give out roughly \$915,000 total, with \$890,000 going to fifty-six businesses and \$25,000 to non-profits. This is about 74% of the total. We paid about 3% towards grant administration and the balance went towards City expenses like emergency sick leave, public safety expenses, PPE, cleaning supplies, new glass dividers, etc.

Let me be clear—the city only took what was left over. We made it clear that we wanted the businesses to get as much as possible. Our estimates were close but there was some left over. If I had a crystal ball and knew how many applications would come through, we would have upped the anti to a higher amount.

As far as contrasting with what other cities around us did, it's going to increase your blood pressure. You may have heard in a neighboring county that one city spent their CARES Grant Funding on a new club house for the golf course. Another one tried unsuccessfully to buy a new ladder truck for their Fire Dept. Another city bragged about the \$500,000 they allocated to their businesses. Nice gesture considering they received \$3.5 million. I could go on and on, but you get the gist of this. The first thing most governments did was try to figure out a way to keep your money from getting to those who pay the taxes. Go figure. Corruption is closer than you think.

I digress. I hope the grant program had a positive impact on our businesses. They pay a substantial amount of money in property taxes. The Grant program was a band aid. You are the true support. Remember to patronize our businesses. Buy your gas, get your car fixed, get a haircut, go to dinner and do whatever else you might do, but try to do it in Ham Lake. Trust me, they will appreciate it!

Please make sure to lock your vehicles, take your garage door openers out and keep your outside lights on. Park inside your garage if possible.


Call 911 immediately if you witness any suspicious activity.

Be Safe on the Ice!

These are general ice thickness guidelines:

- 2 inches or less—stay off!
- 4 inches—ice fishing or other activities on foot
- 5 inches—snowmobile or ATV
- 8-12 inches—car or small pickup
- 12-15 inches—medium truck

These guidelines are for new, clear solid ice. White ice or “snow ice” is only about half as strong as new clear ice. Double the thickness guidelines when traveling on white ice.

What's Happening at the Senior Center

MEALS will be discontinued for the months of January and February, and reviewed again by the Senior Board in February.

EXERCISE SESSIONS will resume on Tuesday, January 5. Classes will be held every Tuesday and Thursday. You must wear a mask and sit 10 feet apart. If you decide to chat before or after class, please stay in your chairs 10 feet apart. You will need to sign in so we can keep track of who is attending. Bring your own beverage if you want to, but **NO FOOD** please!

The Senior Center is located on the west-side lower level of City Hall at 15544 Central Ave NE.

TAX ASSISTANCE for 2021 is in the planning stages. Due to Covid-19 we're unsure of the format. Please contact the Senior Center after the holidays for an update: 763-434-0455

DEFENSIVE DRIVING COURSES for 2021 are now being held by MHSRC (Minnesota Highway Safety Research Center) for those 55 and older.

Registration is required. Call 1-888-234-1294 to find available classes and to register.

Attendees will need to social distance and wear a mask.

4-hour Refresher Course \$22—You need to take this every three years. Time flies so make sure you're current!

8-hour Refresher Course \$26—Required for first timers.

If you are 55 years or older, state law requires your insurance company to give you a 10% discount if you take an 8-hour Defensive Driving Course and attend a 4-hour refresher course every 3 years.

Why Does Ham Lake Plow Snow the Way It Does?

Dealing with large amounts of snow is a challenge for everyone, including the City's snow plow drivers. During and after large snowfalls, the City receives many calls related to plowing. One very popular question is: "When will the plow get to my street?" The City of Ham Lake understands the importance of efficient and timely snow removal and ice control.

Snow plowing policy and processes are reviewed annually to provide for safe travels for the greatest number of persons on the 158 miles of City-managed roadways. The Public Works Department reviews a map of the City's public street systems. (This map clearly delineates thoroughfare and local residential streets.) The map is then divided into six routes plus four cul-de-sac routes for snow removal and ice control. Within each of the areas, the City has classified city streets based on the street function, relative traffic volume and importance to the welfare of the community. Those streets are classified as:

- Priority A streets will be plowed first. These are higher volume streets that connect major sections of the city and provide access for emergency fire, police and medical services.
- Priority B streets are plowed next. These provide access to schools and commercial businesses.
- Priority C are next in line. They are low-volume residential streets.
- Priority D are cul-de-sacs.

The Public Works Superintendent or a designated representative monitors street conditions to determine the timing and amount of equipment and personnel necessary to clear the streets. During large snowfalls the City has six trucks dispatched to plow. The plows are assigned to specific sections of the City. When they leave the shop or "hub," plowing is done from the hub to outlying parts of the City. This saves time, is a more efficient way to plow and prevents plows from having to backtrack on streets already plowed.

Snow plows discharge snow on the right-hand side of the truck or curbside. The routes are designed to allow the trucks to always take right-hand turns to limit time spent backing up or turning around.

Maneuvering a large plow truck is more difficult than a passenger vehicle, especially when there are mounds of snow to drive around and through. Plows travel at an average speed of 10-20 mph, but that pace can be impacted by the amount and weight of snow, traffic, obstacles in roadways, etc. To help the plow drivers please be sure all unattended vehicles are off city streets during or after a snowfall until the streets have been cleared (per Article 6-121 of the City Code).

Some roadways within the City are managed by MnDOT or the Anoka County Highway Department. Examples of those are Highway 65 (managed by MnDOT), Constance Blvd, Crosstown Blvd, Bunker Lake Blvd and Radisson Rd (managed by the Anoka County Highway Department). Questions or concerns about those roads or conditions should be directed to the responsible organization.

Fire Department Calls

The Ham Lake Fire Department responded to 24 calls during November: 12 during the day and 12 at night. These included 7 structure calls (3 Fire Alarms, 1 Shed, 2 CO Alarms, 1 Water Flow Alarm), 2 rescue calls, 6 medical calls, 7 wildland calls, 1 mutual aid call, and 1 misc. call. The department spent 14 hours on calls with total personal time adding up to 179 hours. Year-to-date, the department has answered 407 calls, compared with 493 calls at the same time last year.

November Building Permits

The City of Ham Lake issued 97 permits in November with a valuation of \$992,122.00. The issued permits are as follows: one commercial demolition, one commercial miscellaneous, two residential new construction, one residential addition, four residential basement finish, three residential accessory building, four residential deck, one residential pool, one residential miscellaneous, two residential window and 14 roofing/siding. Other permits include 38 mechanical, 14 plumbing and 11 septic installations.

Winter Driving Safety & Tips

Minnesota's Department of Public Safety offers these tips for safe winter driving:

- Be able to see and be seen. Clean frost and snow off all your windows, mirrors, lights and reflectors. Use your headlights in poor visibility.
- Get a feel for the road. When you first start out, accelerate carefully to test wheel-spin and brake gently to test skidding.
- Be gentle. Use the accelerator and brakes slowly to maintain control of your vehicle.
- Increase your following distance.
- Make your turns slowly and gradually.
- Watch for scattered slippery spots. If you feel yourself losing control, don't brake. Take your foot off the gas and steer as straight as you can until the car slows to a safe speed.
- In an emergency, steer off the road and into a snow bank to avoid a crash.

Christmas Tree & Light Recycling

Christmas trees, holiday lights and extension cords can be dropped off at the north side of the City Hall parking lot for recycling until January 10.

Trees must be clean of decorations and can be placed at the north end of the City Hall parking lot. Place holiday lights and cords in the green and blue collection container near the small garage.

Keep Your Packages Secure

The Anoka County Sheriff's Office has received several reports in Anoka County of packages being stolen from the front step.

As online shopping popularity continues to grow, consider delivering your package to:

- A local relative or trusted neighbor who'll be home to pick it up when it arrives.
- Your office where there's someone there to accept your delivery.
- A PO box or UPS mailbox: be aware that these have a monthly rental cost and not all PO boxes will accept packages. Find out before you rent!
- Search for a locker location near you on Amazon's Locker page or when selecting shipping options at checkout.
- Opt for in-store pickup

The meeting begins at 6:00 pm and will be held in the Ham Lake City Council chambers.



Obey Ham Lake's Snow Rules

Respect your neighbors by following the City's policy on parking and on where to deposit snow and ice. Minnesota law makes it illegal for property owners to deposit snow or ice upon any street or highway. This includes the 15-foot right-of-way from the curb.

This means it's illegal to move snow from your driveway across the street onto the right-of-way of the property across from you.

Display Your Address as City Code Requires

It's the duty of the owner, lessor or occupant of every house, industrial, commercial or other building to have proper house or building numbers in metal, glass, plastic or other durable material.

The numbers should be no less than 12 inches high on all commercial/industrial buildings and a no less than four inches high on residential buildings. They should be in a contrasting color to the building.

The numbers should be placed on structures (not garage doors) so they can be easily seen from the street that fronts on the building.

Numbers also need to be placed on both sides of mailboxes. When mailboxes are in a group the numbers should be placed on the front of each mailbox and on the side of each end mailbox.

All auxiliary buildings within a unit that have an assigned number — such as a garage or barn — are not affected by the code

Ham Lake's Winter Parking Rules

Remember: from October 1 through April 30 NO PARKING is allowed on Ham Lake streets between midnight and 6:00 am.

In addition, no parking is allowed in the daytime hours during or after a two-inch snowstorm or until after the streets are plowed.

Coon Creek Watershed District Update

More than 90% of Ham Lake is within the jurisdiction of Coon Creek Watershed District because it drains to Coon Creek.

Background

Our organization is a special unit of local government focusing on water management within the drainage area of Coon Creek (its watershed). This includes large parts of Andover, Blaine, Coon Rapids and Ham Lake, plus a small area of Columbus.

We were established by citizen petition in 1959. Our boundary expanded in 2012, adding 15 square miles as requested by Fridley, Blaine, Coon Rapids and Spring Lake Park.

Coon Creek Watershed District was originally formed to balance drainage for farming in the Ham Lake area with flood prevention downstream in the new city of Coon Rapids. Since then, many more legal requirements have been added. In the last 15 years, stormwater and water quality have taken on much larger roles as pollution has increased with increased development.

Even so, flood prevention remains a main concern and so we keep public ditches well maintained.

Issues

We are in the "Water Quality Era" where water pollutants are targeted stream by stream. Since 2017 we've been addressing "hotspot" areas using innovative stream restoration design and in-ground filters. These methods deal with legacy issues and cost hundreds of

thousands of dollars to install. While they tend to be downstream in Coon Rapids, they collect pollution also coming from Ham Lake, Andover and Blaine (via Sand Creek).

The cheapest way to deal with pollution is by preventing it in the first place.

Please do what you can to prevent pollution! Proper lawn care and snow removal can really make a difference to our creeks and lakes.
