Fire Department Calls

The Ham Lake Fire Department responded to 34 calls during the month of September: 24 during the day and 10 at night. The department spent 228.5 personal hours responding to calls for the month.

Year-to-date, the department has answered 295 calls, compared with 327 calls at the same time last year.

Let's Get Through Another Snowy Winter Together

It takes teamwork between Ham Lake residents and the City to successfully get us through another snowy winter!

The only thing certain about the weather this winter is that there will be snow, and some of it will fall on Ham Lake's roads and streets.



What the City Will Do

Here's what the City will do about the snow to help you get through it as painlessly as possible:

Streets will be plowed if two or more inches of snow fall. Plowing will begin as soon as feasible after the snowfall stops. During long storms, main routes will be plowed and sanded as soon as the accumulation becomes hazardous for driving.

Every effort will be made to have main routes plowed and sanded before morning or afternoon rush hour. For an average snowfall of three to six inches, the City's goal is to complete all plowing within eight to twelve hours. (Major blizzards take more time.)

What You Can Do

Here's what you can do to help all of us get through a snowy winter as painlessly as possible:

You can help protect your sod by marking the curb line with wooden laths (not metal stakes) until after the first couple of snowfalls.

Avoid any other type of planting or construction in the snow storage area of the City's right-of-way (which extends 20 feet back from the street).

Don't park or store vehicles, boats, etc. in that area either. (You don't really want them covered with heavy piles of snow from the street, do you?)

Remember that it's your responsibility to clean your driveway, areas for trash cans (which can't be in the street) and areas around mailboxes and newspaper tubes.

Keep in mind you'll have to do this without dumping your snow in the street, and without leaving large piles that obstruct vision around your driveway.

Finally, remember not to park your car on the street during a snowfall or overnight during the winter.

Ham Lake's Winter Parking Rules

From October 1 through April 30 no parking is allowed on Ham Lake streets between the hours of midnight and 6:00 am.

In addition, no parking is allowed in the daytime hours during or after a two-inch snowstorm or until the streets are plowed.

At its September 18, 2023 meeting the City Council took the following actions:

Approved items on the Consent Agenda included:

September Building Permits

Youth Snowmobile Safety Class

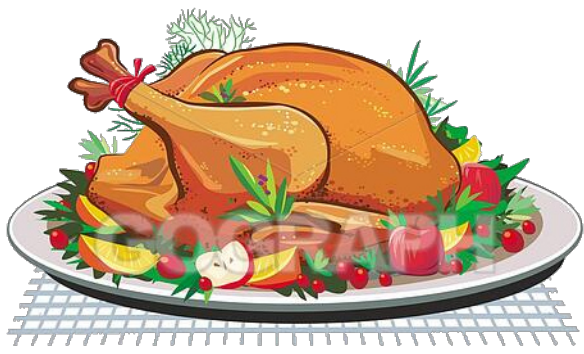

Thanksgiving Safety Tips

Thanksgiving is a wonderful time to gather with friends and family, eat delicious food, watch football (or the parade!) and travel to visit loved ones. While enjoying the holiday and as things might get hectic, it is important to always keep safety in mind.



The top safety hazards during the Thanksgiving holiday include:

- **FIRE**—kitchen fires, candles and outdoor deep fryers are the most common
- **FOOD**—choking and poisoning, cuts and burns during food preparation
- **TRAVEL**—car accidents, driving while intoxicated or distracted

Kitchen Safety

- Keep children away from the stove.
- Do not leave the house while the turkey is cooking.
- Ensure the kitchen floor is kept clear and doesn't have any tripping hazards.
- Keep matches, lighters, candles and knives out of the reach of children.

Holiday Fire Prevention Tips

Thanksgiving is the #1 day of the year for cooking fires, reports State Farm insurance. The US Fire Department confirms that more than 4,000 fires occur on Thanksgiving Day.

Preparing deep fried turkeys using a turkey fryer is the cause of approximately five deaths, 50 injuries and the destruction of 900 homes with more than \$15 million in property damage every year.

Kitchen safety is even more important than usual during busy holiday times like Thanksgiving when more people might be working in the kitchen to prepare a large meal.

But for casual cooks and experienced chefs alike the kitchen presents more hazards than imagined. Some of the most common kitchen tasks send people to the ER every day. Plan your next family gathering to be even safer!

- Keep baking soda on hand to put out kitchen fires.
- Don't leave food cooking or the stove unsupervised.
- Make sure smoke alarms are working.
- A household fire extinguisher should always be nearby.
- Do not leave candles burning unattended and do not burn candles near flammable items like curtains or potpourri.
- Follow all instructions carefully when using a deep fryer and monitor closely!

Food Safety

Incidents of choking and food poisoning increase during the holidays, especially around Thanksgiving as people are preparing and consuming more food than usual.

Food Safety News reports that approximately 51 million turkeys are consumed on Thanksgiving.

- Always wash your hands after handling raw or under-cooked poultry.
- Use separate cutting boards for raw meat and produce to prevent cross-contamination.
- The USDA recommends cooking the turkey at a minimum of 325°. Use a food thermometer and cook the turkey to an internal temperature of 165 to 180° to ensure the turkey is cooked thoroughly and to avoid illness caused by consuming under-cooked poultry.

City Hall collection box for flexible plastics. Everything must be clean. Grocery bags, bread bags, bubble wrap, dry cleaning bags, newspaper sleeves, ice bags, plastic shipping envelopes, re-closable food storage bags, cereal bags, water bottle case overwrap, salt bags, pallet wrap and stretch film, wood pellet bags and produce bags are all accepted.

Senior Dining on Mondays and Wednesdays each week at noon. **Reservations needed!** Meals are \$7 for those 55+ and \$10 for those younger than 55.

Senior Center Activities include vet coffee, fitness class, fun cribbage, wood carving, Bingo, 500 cards and Dominoes.

- Store leftovers within 2 hours or toss them.

Pet Safety

The Veterinary Medical Association warns that turkey and chicken bones should never be given to pets because they can splinter and pets may choke.

Dogs should be kept away from any dish that has onions, leeks, garlic, raisins, grapes or chocolate. Those foods can be hazardous to your dog's health.

Holiday Travel Safety

With Thanksgiving being one of the most travel-heavy times of the year, it's important to be prepared before hitting the road and to drive defensively, especially during bad weather.

Drivers who are texting take their eyes off the road for an average of five seconds. Driving at 55 mph, that's about the length of a football field.

- Buckle up, every trip.
- Make sure your vehicle is well maintained.
- Plan your route ahead of time.
- Carry an emergency kit in the car.
- Be aware of weather conditions.
- Take caution in parking lots while out shopping.
- No texting while driving.

According to the National Highway Safety Association, more than 40% of holiday car accidents involve alcohol. **DO NOT DRINK AND DRIVE.**

What Plastic Resin Codes and Products are Recyclable

Recycling Myth: Any plastic item with a recycling symbol can be recycled.

Fact: The recycling symbol is not regulated and can be found on recyclable and non-recyclable plastic products. The purpose is to identify what kind of plastic resin the container is made from.

The following plastic numbers (resin codes) are recyclable throughout the Twin Cities metro area:

#1, #2 and #5

#1: Clear plastic bottles, cups and produce containers (beware #6 cups can look just like #1. Always look for the resin code).

#2: Translucent milk jugs and opaque bottles like milk, juice, laundry products, health and beauty products.

#5: Dairy product tubs, pudding and fruit cups, to-go cups

4-Hour Refresher Course: You need to take this every three years. Time flies, so make sure you are current! The fee is \$24 for the 4-hour class:

Friday, November 10th: 12:00 - 4:00 pm

8-Hour Course for "First Timers"

There are none scheduled at this time.

Did you know? If you are 55 years or older, state law requires your insurance company to give you a 10% discount after taking an 8-hour Defensive Driving Course and attending a 4-hour refresher course every three years.

NOTE: The Ham Lake Senior Center is NOT available for rent!

Update on Blaine-Ham Lake Area Well Interferences

The DNR completed investigating 50 of the well interference complaints that came in from Ham Lake residents in 2022.

The DNR determined that pumping at the City of Blaine's municipal wells was the primary cause of water supply problems in 47 of these private wells, while two golf courses were each a minor contributor to one complaint. The DNR found that three of the complaints were unrelated to nearby high-volume water use. The City of Blaine has reimbursed the 47 complainants with valid interferences for the costs they incurred to restore their normal water supply.

The DNR is still administering the well interference process for remaining complaints. Did you experience loss of water or a major decrease in pressure due to a drop in your well's water level and work with a licensed well contractor to resolve the issue? If so, you may file a well interference complaint by sending an email to: well.interference.dnr@state.mn.us that includes the following:

- Work done to restore water supply

Don't Move Snow Illegally

Did you know moving snow onto or across a city street is illegal, dangerous and costly to taxpayers?

MN State Statute 160.2715 states:

(a) Except for the actions of the road authorities, their agents, employees, contractors, and utilities in carrying out their duties imposed by law or contract, and except as herein provided, it shall be unlawful to:

(1) obstruct any highway or deposit snow or ice thereon; (b) Any violation of this section is a misdemeanor.

There are several issues that arise when snow is pushed into or across the street. One is increased spring flooding. The city's storm water system is designed to flow freely and with minimal restriction to holding areas and other water conveyances. If that system becomes blocked due to an illegal snow pile, it can begin to back up and flood streets, yards and even houses.

There is also the added wear and tear and sometimes damage to city vehicles. Some of these snow banks will freeze solid and if hit by a plow, can damage and even destroy the plow, costing taxpayer's money and time to repair the plow (time that would be better spent clearing the roads of snow for residents).

And lastly, there is the added cost to taxpayers for city crews, vehicles, and equipment to go out and remove the illegal snow to a safe location.

Now Hiring: Snow Plow Operators

Ham Lake is accepting applications for on-call seasonal (November through April) snow plow operators. Duties include operating vehicles and equipment such as pickups with plows, tractors, bobcat and snow blowers for snow removal, as well as shoveling. Salary is \$20.40 per hour.

Minimum Requirements: Must be at least 18 years with a high school diploma or GED, and possess a valid class D driver's license. Hiring a Snow/Ice Removal Service?

Ask if they are *Smart Salting certified* for parking lots and sidewalks by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA). This voluntary certification gives contractors proven techniques for snow and ice removal while preventing harm to our creeks, rivers, lakes and groundwater!

When it only takes one teaspoon of salt to permanently contaminate five gallons of water, it's very important to only use what is needed.

Once salt is in our water it stays there accumulating year after year. Besides corroding metal infrastructure like pipes and their metal joints (not to mention vehicles and concrete), salt disrupts aquatic food webs, degrades soil and can lead to salty drinking water (just ask folks in Madison, Wisconsin)!

What to Do

The cheapest, and only, way to deal with salt pollution is prevention.

- Expect winter driving and walking conditions. In other words, sl-o-o-o-w down
- Use snow tires to give your vehicle much better grip than all-season radial tires
- Wear winter footwear.

If you use de-icers, make sure you use the right amount at the right time and right place. If you want traction, use sand and sweep up any extra.
